We are incredibly proud to announce that a group of pupils from Houlton School have won a prestigious V&A Innovate National Schools Award.



The pupils, who are all members of Houlton's Obama College, took part in the national challenge to design a solution to a real-world problem.

With close to 2,000 pupils taking part, 119 teams entering ideas and just 50 pupils from across the country selected for the Annual Pitching and Awards Day at the V&A Museum in London, the competition was tough.

Taking inspiration from the V&A's 'Design: 1900 – Now' galleries, pupils were tasked with proposing design ideas for the themes of Renew, Connect, and Move. This included a focus on more sustainable uses of materials and ways of living, ways to support people to (re)connect following COVID-19, and more inclusive ways to keep active and enjoy the outdoors.

After wowing the judges with their entry, the Houlton School team walked away with the award for the Move category. Their design, entitled 'The Rewalkable' was an adjustable, moisture sensing walking stick for the partially sighted, made from recycled products.

Mr Russell Hill, Subject Leader: Creative at Houlton School, said: "Our young designers were so excited to win this award. They have worked incredibly hard and it was fantastic that the judges recognised their incredible creativity, innovation and teamwork.

"Everyone showed such maturity, resilience and enthusiasm, not just for the project, but for the impact that creating sustainable items can and could have in the future."







Celebrating World Book Day across the Trust

Pupils across the Transforming Lives Educational Trust took part in a host of events to mark the 25th World Book Day.

At Henry Hinde Infant School, staff surprised pupils with a 'Masked Reader' challenge. Taking inspiration from the TV show - The Masked Singer - staff members recorded a masked video of themselves reading extracts from their favourite children's books. While pupils across every year group were also invited to take part in a school-wide photo competition, encouraging them to recreate the covers of well-known books.

Pupils from Henry Hinde Junior School created their very own costumes to wear in celebration of their love of reading. Each class selected a theme for their designs, ranging from children's classics including 101 Dalmatians, Alice in Wonderland, Charlie and the Chocolate Factory and the Wizard of Oz, to modern favourites such as the The Day the Crayons Quit, Magnus Chase and Varmints. Year 6 pupils even chose to focus on their favourite book - The Thesaurus!

At Ashlawn School, pupils and staff alike embraced the opportunity to dress up in a host of wonderful costumes as part of a school-wide competition and across each year group there were many discussions about the joy of reading a good book.

While at Houlton School, pupils worked in teams to create their own children's books. They had to plan, write, illustrate, edit and publish their creations as six-page storybooks designed to help young children to learn. The topics of their books varied, including the numbers 1-10, key animal facts, how to identify emotions, making friends, being confident, facing fears and many more. The finished products have now been completed and will be delivered to Reception pupils at Henry Hinde Infant School.

Henry Hinde Junior School launches new reading initiative

Pupils at Henry Hinde Junior School have been benefiting from a new reading initiative that was introduced earlier this term.

The 'Accelerated Reader' is a programme designed to encourage children to develop their love of books, extending their vocabulary and fluency in reading as well as building a lifelong desire to read for pleasure.

In addition to a revamped library, featuring lots of new books for pupils to choose from, children are expected to read for 5 to 10 minutes a day at home before having their diary signed by their parent or carer. Once children have finished their book, they will have the opportunity in school to take an online quiz to test their

understanding of what they have read.

Jennie Nurse, Principal at Henry Hinde Junior School, said: "Reading opens up such a magical world for children to explore, so we encourage our pupils to enjoy reading at school and at home with their families every day.

"We are so pleased with the way that the children have embraced our new Accelerated Reader programme, they particularly love the chance to visit the library and pick out an exciting new book."

Marking Safer Internet Day

In an increasingly digital world, it can sometimes feel difficult to keep track of what our children are accessing online.

Safer Internet Day offered the perfect

opportunity for our schools to revisit this topic and make the most of a range of new resources that were published for schools, pupils and parents.

As part of National Careers Week, pupils at Ashlawn School were encouraged to explore potential careers and think about the employability skills they would need for the future.

During a 'Careers Speed Dating' event, Year 9 pupils had the chance to talk to a host of 29 incredible employers who gave up their time to share their experiences and expertise in relation to the world of work.

Also this term, Year 12 students have had the chance to undertake work experience placements to find out more about their chosen sectors. For one student, Lilia, this meant spending two days with firefighters at the London Battersea Heliport, learning about aviation and aircraft firefighting. While another student spent her time based in an international school in Brussels, Belgium.

Over the last few months, pupils at Henry Hinde Junior School have been taking on a range of leadership opportunities to support their peers. The Junior Leadership Team (JLT), which consists of two pupils from each class, brings together pupils' ideas for developing life at school. Meeting every few weeks, pupils have the chance to express their views on the topic of the day and, on reaching Year 6, candidates can put themselves forward to become Head Boy and Head Girl as part of school-wide elections.

The school is also proud of the role that newly appointed Peer Wellbeing Mentors and Reading Ambassadors have been playing in life at Henry Hinde Juniors. In their respective roles, pupils receive a range of training and guidance in order to be able to develop the skills required to support pupils of all ages across the school.

Jennie Nurse, Principal at Henry Hinde Junior School, said: "We believe that it is vitally important for our pupils to be involved in life across their school, to have a say in how we operate and have the chance to support others.

"We value the hard work of all of the pupils who take part, and can see the pride they take in the roles they hold."



World Class Schools at Houlton

Houlton School provided an incredible base for the 2022 World Class Schools Quality Mark (WCSQM) Assessment Centre

During the event, Houlton welcomed 175 pupils from 30 primary and secondary schools for a day of challenges in order to achieve WCSQM re-accreditation.

In order to achieve World Class Quality Mark accreditation, pupils must demonstrate World Class characteristics, using the WCSQM framework of characteristics as a benchmark of the skills and competencies young people need to thrive in an ever-changing global economy.

Visiting pupils were given two weeks to prepare and a day to complete eleven innovative, attractive and environmentally friendly outdoor and indoor spaces, all incorporating the Houlton School values. Pupils worked together to design a sensory garden, eco-friendly seating, murals, sculptures and tree hangings, supported by Houlton's staff and partners as industry experts, with advice from a focus group of Houlton's Year 7 pupils who acted as Project Managers for the day.

Michael McCulley, Principal at Houlton School, said: "It was a great honour to host this year's World Class Schools event for schools from across the country.

"As a new school, we were unable to make our own application for accreditation, but it is certainly something we are working towards for the future. That said, our pupils did a marvellous job as Project Managers and we now have a fantastic array of unique installations across the school site for our pupils to enjoy."
