"Proud doesn't even begin to describe it...": Ashlawn School applauded by Ofsted

Ashlawn School has been widely praised by Ofsted following a full inspection in June that reviewed all aspects of school life.

In the last graded inspection in 2022, the school was given the lowest possible grading, but this time the inspectors found that there had been a "profound shift in culture", "significant improvement" and a community that is "working together...with even greater ambition for the school."

As a result, the school has now been judged as Good in all areas – with many of the comments reflecting that Ashlawn is close to even better outcomes.

Paul Brockwell, Principal at Ashlawn School, said: "When I first walked through the doors in 2022, the potential in this school was tangible. With TLET we have systematically looked at how we can bring that promise to life in everything that we do – and the way that the community has responded to that challenge has been uplifting.

"There is not one element of this school that hasn't moved forward with pace, and that is testament to the fact that we are all committed to one thing – and that is "our best, always".

Inspectors noted that behaviour expectations are "high and clearly communicated", lessons are "calm and purposeful, the well-designed curriculum is "ambitious" and that pupils "work hard and achieve well".

The Sixth Form received particular praise, with students "valuing the quality of their learning and wider experiences". It was also noted that those in the sixth form are "impressively keen to contribute to the school community and are excellent role models."







"The myriad of extra-curricular and enrichment opportunities" was also praised, as was the fact that "staff feel valued" and "parents talk positively about having their voice heard".

Paul added: "The most important thing is that our students shone throughout the inspection – and their attitudes, behaviours and successes are the best reflection of a school."

Within the report, TLET's leadership was also recognised for taking "decisive action" after the last inspection. Due to this, inspectors concluded "all areas for improvement have been addressed effectively".

James Higham, CEO at TLET, said: "The last two and a half years have been significant for Ashlawn, and the whole team should be acknowledged for their collective efforts and commitment.

"No stone has been left unturned, and taking the relatively rare step of jumping two judgement grades in one inspection is testament to this. It is an amazing feeling that I hope everyone associated with Ashlawn will feel part of – proud doesn't even begin to describe it.

"This is, however, a step on a much bigger journey. There is more that we want to aspire to and achieve – and that is what makes the future for Ashlawn School so exciting."

## Innovative plans to reimagine the future of the Trust's primary school provision have been announced this term.

Proposals have been approved to enable Houlton School to become an all-through provision - meaning that children will have the option to learn there from their first day of primary school until the moment that they head off to university or employment. Henry Hinde Infant and Junior Schools will also be joining together on one site.

James Higham, CEO at TLET, said: "Our Trust is committed to bringing people together to inspire a sense of community and help our children to thrive.

"As part of this, it is right that we look at every opportunity to enhance what we do in our schools, and two things have come together that can really enhance what we are able to offer."

At Houlton School a purpose-built primary building will be developed next to the existing secondary school by Urban&Civic, the master developers of the wider Houlton community. Planning permission has also just been granted, meaning that building works can proceed - with the opening of the primary provision planned for September 2026.

James added: "The prospect of an all-through school at Houlton is an exciting one. The children and young people will still have their own distinct areas to play, learn and socialise but they will also be able to benefit from shared resources, facilities

"Primary aged children, for example, will be able to experience science labs and have access to specialist teachers for subjects like languages, and older children will have some amazing leadership and mentoring

experiences. It is a win-win situation for everyone."

Staff and children at Henry Hinde Infant and Junior Schools will be spending the next 12 months working together on plans to move to one site at the start of the 2026 academic year.

Currently the two school sites are 300 yards apart, and already share leaders, curriculums and approaches. This move will make logistics much easier for many of our families and provides an exciting opportunity to reimagine the learning environment and maximise resources to provide the very best for our children.

James said: "The site of the Junior School has so much space for our children to play and learn, and there are lots of possibilities to develop the existing building to ensure that there is an amazing environment for slightly younger children.

"In fact, bringing the two schools


conclusion to years of work - and the in the immediate community meant that now felt like a good time to take that next step.

"By joining together, we can focus more of our finances, resources and investment on what happens in the classroom - and less on the buildings and infrastructure."

The fact that both announcements have come together is not something that the Trust had planned.

"As with anything, these are not decisions that we have taken in isolation. They are the product of either months of discussions or based on opportunities that have presented themselves to us," stated James.

He added: "However, the fact that we are announcing these two exciting pieces of news at the same time does make it feel like a milestone moment - and the start of another new and





# We're proud to report that Tommy Lloyd, a former Henry Hinde and Ashlawn School pupil who now works in TLET's finance team, has received the Mayor's Special Appreciation Award.

Tommy joined TLET as a trainee accountant last year after completing his Sixth Form studies and also volunteers as a governor at a local primary school – despite gradually losing his mobility as a result of Muscular Dystrophy. His inspirational story caught the attention of Mayor Barbara Brown, who presented him with the award at Houlton School.

Tommy, who was diagnosed with the muscle wasting condition when he was just six, wants to encourage youngsters to believe they can achieve their dreams. He said: "It's hard for young people anyway, let alone people with a disability. You have to focus on what you can do rather than what you can't.

"My life is a challenge physically and mentally so being able to work on something I really enjoy is important and motivating for me.

"I would say to anyone who feels like they can't achieve, they can - they just need to find something they enjoy and focus on that." The former Henry Hinde and Ashlawn School pupil said he was very excited to be given the opportunity to train as an accountant - something he'd always wanted to do.

On receiving the Mayor's award, he said: "I felt proud that I was doing a good job. I love my job and the people I work with, and I feel grateful to be given the opportunity. I felt happy I was recognised by the Mayor as a valued member of the team."

Mayor Barbara Brown said Tommy was 'a true inspiration'.

She added: "His determination to overcome the challenges he faces every day is matched by his ambition to make a positive difference to the world, both through his work at TLET and his voluntary role as a governor.

"He's an amazing example of what can be achieved through passion and positivity, and really represents the best of Rugby."

# Houlton School's Curriculum Enrichment Week was the perfect way to end the academic year.


